Supervisor Liotta opened the meeting. She led everyone in the Pledge of Allegiance. A moment of silence was observed for our service men and women, first responders and veterans, particularly those who have paid the ultimate price, along with thanks to healthcare workers who tirelessly work to save lives every day.

## **HISTORICAL MOMENTS**

Historian Leanna Hale discussed The Association of Public Historians of New York State (APHNYS) conference she attended last week. She gave a speech on "Bringing Back Cursive". This was a very successful event, where Leanna discussed the Cursive Summer Camp held at the Clarkson Academy annually in August. She mentioned the latest Science Report, which discussed the advantages of cursive writting versus using a keyboard. Leannas' desire is to make Clarkson the Cursive Capitol of Western New York. /\* There is a new informational society recently formed, called The Triangle Tract society, which includes Clarkson, Hamlin, Brockport, Bergen and Leroy. They plan to post events from each town on a newly formed website. First meeting scheduled for October 17 at Whitehall Mansion. /\* Pioneer Day for 4th and 5th graders at the Hill School will be held Friday, October 25 at the Clarkson Academy.

## **PUBLIC HEARING**

Local Law #6-2024 Keeping of Chickens. Supervisor Liotta read the legal notice regarding the proposed Introductory Local Law. The Town Board is re-visiting this law after input from neighbors and residents, along with further research, in efforts to improve on this proposed law. Mike Fitzgerald, 114 Delaina Rose Circle, mentioned he has 6 chickens and feels that he has appropriate space for his chickens and is a model chicken owner. He was unfamiliar with the proposed modifications to the law and the details. He feels he offers a clean, fair amount of space for his chickens and the neighbors never complain. Daniel Payne, 9410 Ridge Rd W., inquired about the proposed law and why this was even being discussed. Supervisor Liotta advised that complaints are on the rise regarding chickens in residential areas along with concerns from residents. She referrenced Cornell University and an article about the adverse effects of having chickens and improper maintainance. Discussion on details of the proposed law ensued. This new law stems from mounting complaints about nuisance chicken owners and to protect smaller neighborhoods. Daniel Payne inquired about tending to those residents directly and avoid painting a broad brush across the town by making this chicken law. Supervisor Liotta mentioned that the law is being created for that exact reason. Code Enforcement Officer, Kevin Moore, mentioned the growing concerns for fox, rats, wildlife and the possible diseases that they carry, happening in residential areas regardless if they have a clean living space.

Gwyn Parkhurst, 3412 Lake Road, mentioned her concerns with the chickens next door. Kevin Moore advised that chicken complaints supercedes any other resident complaint in the Town of Clarkson. Daniel Payne mentioned differences of free range chickens and if legislation will be regarding them as well. Supervisor Liotta mentioned the Town Board wants people to contact the Building Department with any questions on the subject, especially new residents. Tim Murphy, 18 Lynnwood Drive, wished to applaud the Town Board in reviewing this growing concern within the town, and proposing this law. Kevin Moore advised the procedures, if necessary, to a resident who is cited for their chickens. He would visit the property owner; then a give a notice of violation; followed by an order to remedy within 30 days. If needed, an appearance ticket will be issued. Councilperson Wexler inquired about an area variance. Kevin Moore advised procedures of doing so.

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

This designation also means homeowners must maintain the historic nature of their property. Clarkson is 1 of 50 towns in New York State with national designation.

## Supervisors Report -

Tax Cap – flyers provided by the State Comptrollers' Office are in the lobby, regarding the tax capped at 2% for the 4th year in a row. Supervisor Liotta read portions of the flyer. She mentioned the 2025 budget and the upcoming workshops and meetings, after meeting with the financial department. As of now, the town board is able to stay within the tax cap as that is their goal.

**WIBA#1** – there was a pre-construction meeting this morning with Pilon Construction and MRB Group, the engineers for the water project. A flyer was provided showing the contractors schedule of roads and dates. Construction is to begin very soon.

**Hafner Park** – the redesign project survey is complete. MRB Group shared a draft review of the survey with residents input. It is not ready for public viewing at this time, but will be soon after Town Board review.

**Monroe Ambulance** – we have been contracted with them since 2014. The town continues to receive a monthly review of all calls within our jurisdiction. The response time is within all guidelines set in the contract. They are very accountable for the service and work they provide. The contract is automatically renewed annually.

**Monroe County Sheriff's Office** – a letter has been received from MCSO regarding an overview of how they are serving their constituents. She read from the flyer provided that is located in the lobby.

**Monroe County Legislator Jackie Smith** – is holding a community event at the Jubilee Church on September 28, where she is emphasizing the many county service programs provided through-out the area.

## **Town Board Reports -**

**Seymour Library** – Councilperson Wexler discussed how pleased the Library Director Patrick Pittman is with how little disruption on a daily basis for their visitors, even with the construction in the parking lot.

**Building Inspector** - Kevin Moore advised construction is on track at the Seymour Library, regarding the plumbing. /\* Stormwater requirements are also in order at this time, according to the constraints of the DEC-Department of Environmental Conservation.

**Highway Department** – Superintendent Viscardi mentioned for residents to be vigilant of the work being done on and near area roads, due to the water project. Traffic will be reduced to one lane and be slower where work is being done. Pilon Construction has a tight schedule to complete this project within 180 days.
